VALLEY OF NEW BERN MEMORIAL DAY CEREMONY AT NEW BERN NATIONAL CEMETERY

On Monday, May 27th, various Masonic organizations, including members of the Scottish Rite Valley of New Bern, veterans and the community attended the Memorial Day Ceremony at the New Bern National Cemetery to pay tribute to the lives of the men and women buried in the cemetery. All are veterans that took a sacred oath to defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies and to safeguard and guarantee the freedoms we enjoy. The purpose is not only to honor their memories but preserve and carry their commitment to freedom. First established on February 1, 1867, New Bern National Cemetery was initially used to reinter remains from the numerous battlefield cemeteries around the area, including nearly 1,000 unknown soldiers and the remains of Union soldiers who died at the Battle of New Bern. The Memorial Day program consisted of the Invocation, presentation of the National Colors, singing of the National Anthem by Sam Lewis, the Pledge of Allegiance, and introduction of Gold Star Families. Mark Sandvigen, Chairman of the Veterans Council of Craven County (VCCC) opened the ceremony and presented the principal speaker, Dr. Ronald E. Walters, PhD, Principal Deputy Under Secretary for Memorial Affairs (PDUSMA) for the National Cemetery Administration (NCA) and the keynote speaker, Dr. Carrie A. Brown, PhD, D-ABFA, ACC. Dr. Brown is a Supervisory Forensic Anthropologist and Laboratory Manager at the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) Laboratory on Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska. Both speakers focused on the identification



and repatriation process of the remains of Army Air Corps Staff Sergeant Robert L Ferris Jr. a B-17 Ball Turret Gunner 80 years after his aircraft was shot down by a German fighter and crashed near the village of Bernières-sur-Seine, France. The program closed with the placing of veteran and community wreaths and sounding of Taps. That was the case on May 20, 2024, when Eureka Lodge No. 3 [Prince Hall Affiliated] of Fayetteville invited its AF&AM brethren to attend its second Stated of the month. Little did the 15 AF&AM members in attendance know what was in store beyond the lodge's usual business.

After the standard business items were taken care of, Eureka's Worshipful Master, Brian I. Pickering, called for AF&AM brothers Thomas Pope, James Pugsley, Jonathan Strange and Mark Saults to assemble west of the altar. They were met there by Past Masters Larry White and Robert Salters, who surprised the four with certificates of honorary membership.

What's historic about that? Eureka No. 3 was chartered on March 2, 1867. In its 157-year history, Eureka bestowed honorary membership only once, and that was on Brother Milton "Toby" Fitch Jr., who at that time was serving as the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of North Carolina.

In recognition of their efforts in helping promote unity and brotherhood between AF&AM and PHA in the Fayetteville area, Bros. Pope, Pugsley, Strange and Saults were invited to become a part of Eureka's history.



How is that pertinent to Scottish Rite?

Because all four AF&AM brothers are members of the Scottish Rite. Ill. Bro. Pope serves as the Personal Representative and Director of the Work to the Valley of Fayetteville Lodge of Perfection, and Bro. Pugsley is the Valley's General Secretary. Bros. Strange and Saults became Masters of the Royal Secret in 2023. In addition to being members of the Valley of Fayetteville: Ill. Bro. Pope is a member of the Valley of New Bern, and Bros. Pugsley, Strange and Saults are on the roll at the Valley of Greensboro. Bros. Salters and White are Scottish Rite 33rds and members of Edward Evans Consistory No. 196 in Fayetteville, which is under the jurisdiction of the United Supreme Council.

He was born June 13, 1938 in Wilmington, NC to Julian Augustus Barbot, Sr and Vera Hawes Barbot. He attended New Hanover High School and played French Horn in their Marching Band and the School Orchestra. He also was a member of their Radio Club. James was a member of the First Baptist Church in Wilmington.

After high school, James, attended NCSU, graduating in 1962 with a B.S. in Electrical Engineering. He was in AFROTC and the Engineering clubs. He worked as an Radio and TV Engineer for WRAL, helping with the installation of the new Station facilities

during that time. Jim worked with many Radio Stations in the area and is still remembered by those who followed him.

When he entered active duty in the US Air Force, he was assigned to a radar site at Montauk Point, NY as a Micro Wave Engineer and later was transferred to Hanscom AFB in Massachusetts as a First Lt. He work in Greenland, the DEW Line and other northern points in the communication area.

ITT hired James when he left the AF and he moved to Raleigh. After several years, he started his on Consulting and Development Communication Company. He was one of the pioneers and founders of Self Service Gasoline and other types of electronic communication equipment.

James was a member and leader of the ISA and IEEE. He belonged to First Baptist Church and served as a Deacon and Youth Leader. He was a Past Master of the Millbrook Masonic Lodge # 97 and a 33rd Degree Scottish Rite Mason.

He was married to Jane Owen Barbot for 62 years and had a son, James Claudius Barbot, Jr. He is predeceased by brother Julian A. Barbot, Jr. and his parents.

He is a former member of the American Business Club, several trade organizations, active in Asheville Rotary Breakfast Club and a member of the Vestry of St. Mary's Episcopal Church.

THAT BEAUTIFUL AND DIVINE DECLARATION

In the summer of 2008, I was on active military duty in the desert of southern Afghanistan as an advisor to a ranking commander, along with my British counterpart. With the Independence Day holiday approaching, an afternoon of celebration had been arranged for that day that included sporting events and as much of a feast as we could pull off. Following a meeting, the Commander asked a few questions and obviously had some enjoyment, sharing the joy of Independence, at the expense of the British officer who did not have to be made aware of whose defeat we were ultimately celebrating. The British officer made some snide remark, in his opinion, that the colonists were mostly criminals and former convicts anyway. I counted to ten and envisioned his dental work on the floor. After a breath, I calmly remarked that if that were the case, not many chose to return to the bondage of England. The commander broke the uncomfortable silence when he turned to me, with a gleam in his eye, and stated the free people of Afghanistan had won their Independence twice from the British…and a third time should not be overlooked. That statement… was a beautiful and powerful declaration

We are entering into a period of celebrations that will culminate in the 250th celebration of our Nations beautiful declaration. One that we declare can be repeated against tyranny as often as necessary. Our next big event is the **250th Anniversary of the meeting of the First Provincial Congress**, which will be celebrated in **New Bern** on **August 23-24**, **2024**. Plans are already underway to make this a big celebration with many of our Masonic Bodies collaborating and participating in this public event, to include the hard-working Brethren of the Valley of New Bern. Key to this celebration is the pre-Declaration document of the New Bern Resolves.

As to the Declaration of Independence, made public in 1776, you may recall it is comprised of 5 different sections. They are; the introduction, the preamble, the indictment of King George, the denunciation of the British people and the conclusion. Additionally, there are 4 key ideas expressed in the Declaration; equality, unalienable rights, consent of the governed, and the right to alter or abolish government. The document was an "in your face declaration" against the most powerful tyrant of that day. Against tyranny, declaration of self-rule is an invitation for war. It was necessary for this document to contain something powerful and absolute, to be taken seriously by the King and the rest of the world. That was accomplished in a **beautiful and divine way.**

As Masons, we know the source of all things and in Whom we place all our trust and hope. Masonically, this gives us the right and authority for petition of membership and to receive the degrees of Freemasonry. Without it, entrance and participation would be fraudulent. The colonials, in search of religious freedom, knew the Creator was the only source and authority whom they knew they could truly place their trust, for all things of hope and happings. This ha

could truly place their trust, for all things of hope and happiness. This became clear to all with the statement, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness". Jefferson refers to our Creator three times in the Declaration, and each one is different. In one reference he uses the term "Nature's God", later he uses "Creator" and lastly "Divine Providence"

By the authority given men by their Creator, they made their Declaration to the World. Without apology they declared the right and absolute intention to be in bondage only to their Creator and live their lives in a way where they choose their own opportunities and the limits on their ability to do so. With that in mind, the colonials proclaimed this beautiful and divine declaration. Let us always remember this in our celebrations of Independence, Liberty, and Justice for all.

So mote it be.

250^M ANNIVERSARY OBSERVANCE OF THE NEW BERN RESOLVES AMERICA'S FIRST PROVINCIAL CONGRESS NEW BERN, NORTH CAROLINA
