THE ARK OF THE COVENANT

In the Scottish Rite 4th degree, the Ark of the Covenant sits in the East, behind the Master. It is mentioned and shown in the 15th degree, Knight of the East. As the Master of the Palace is showing Zerubbabel around the Treasure Room, he shows Zerubbabel the Ark. Zerubbabel falls down prostrate in front of the Ark but is not tempted enough to reveal the secrets of Masonry. King Cyrus gives the treasures back to Zerubbabel, along with what it takes to go back and rebuild the Temple.

King Solomon along with Hiram, King of Tyre and Hiram Abiff, built the original Temple around 967 BC. After completion, the Ark is seated within the Kodesh Hakodashim or Holy of Holies.

A detailed description is given of what the Ark looked like. Most notably to Freemasons, the Ark in several descriptions is made with acacia wood, covered with gold and a lid was fashioned with two Cherubim on the lid. It is 45" long, 27" high, and 27" wide.

The First Temple was destroyed in 586 BC by Nebuchadnezzar of the Babylonian Empire. All of the treasures were taken but

there is no mention that the Ark of the Covenant was among the spoils. King Cyrus of Persia conquered the Babylonians in 558 BC and allowed the Jews to return home. He also helped fund the rebuilding of the Temple and returned their treasures.

Some say that it was removed from the Temple prior to being conquered by the Babylonians. Many believe it was smuggled out of the city to a safe location before it could be taken. To this day, its whereabouts remain a mystery.

One persistent rumor about the Ark's current whereabouts stems from another legend that suggests an Ethiopian prince took the sacred container back to his homeland for safe keeping in the 6th century BCE. Each year, the festival of St Mary of Zion takes place in the city of Aksum, otherwise known as the City of the Covenant.

To this day, it is said to be stored under Our Lady Mary of Zion's Church. It is guarded by priests. No one is allowed in to see it.
